year-round studio access;


classes, workshops and learning programs;



Our mandate to provide access to print facilities for artists and the broader community - for which demand is continually growing - requires the complex negotiation of regular studio access, workshop and class programming, necessary facility maintenance and financial sustainability.

The evolving nature of print itself, as an expanding and crossdisciplinary field, entails the expansion of our facilities, equipment and expertise into new and emerging hybrid practices, in order to retain Megalo's reputation as a site for the generation of innovative practice.

Inflationary pressures both within Australia and internationally are demonstrably affecting both our communities' capacity to access Megalo facilities, and supplier requirements in delivering resources and materials essential for service provision. Competition across and beyond our sector, in a period of recovery and recuperation, continues to affect Megalo's capacity to grow support for activities beyond regular operations.









BUILDING TOWARDS THE FUTURE ARTS PRECINCT

Megalo Print Studio is one of seven leading arts organisations participating in the ACT Government's development of the future arts precinct at Kingston, led by the Suburban Land Agency and artsACT. This new precinct will establish a unique arts destination, and provide exceptional opportunities for creative engagement and expression for artists, audiences, visitors and the broader community.


Megalo is privileged to play a role in this initiative, and we are committed to supporting its success through connections and collaborations with our peer organisations, and all stakeholders involved in the future precinct.

Megalo's current location is directly adjacent to the future arts precinct site; and with construction expected to take place within the life of this plan, we anticipate intermittent disruption to our regular schedule of studio activities from 2023 onwards. To ensure that we are able to maintain our expected

levels of service to our communities, Megalo's planning through 2023-2026 incorporates provision for expanded offsite and outreach programming during periods of restricted access to our facilities. Much of this activity will be delivered in partnership with peer arts and community organisations, further strengthening our collaborative connections; and Megalo will also strive to work with and support our colleagues in this period of transition.

Once open, the new arts precinct will bring with it new opportunities for creative growth, alongside new expectations from our communities for extended access to our studio facilities, workshops and programs. To ensure that Megalo can effectively contribute to the success of the precinct right from the start, our planning throughout this period will incorporate the flexibility to respond to these expectations and opportunities, centred upon collaboration and communication with our colleagues and communities.





STRATEGIC COMMITMENTS AND GOALS

Megalo's activities and operations in 2023-2026 will seek to deliver on our mission of sharing and supporting the creative voices of our communities through four primary goals:

Maintaining and expanding access to print facilities for all members of our communities

Increasing opportunities for developing creative and professional practice in print

Embedding engagement with print throughout the cultural life of Canberra and beyond

Ensuring sustainability and supporting organisational growth

These strategic goals and commitments will be supported through a cohesive and integrated creative program including artist residencies, workshops and classes, exhibitions, public events and collaborative initiatives, with many activities effectively addressing multiple priorities.

STRATEGIC COMMITMENT 1

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultural and artistic practice

Throughout our history, Megalo has been privileged to work with many First Nations artists and organisations, and to support their voices through creative and cultural practice; and we are committed to maintaining this support across all areas of our activities.

Key Activities

Maintain respectful and meaningful dialogue with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community members and organisations across all areas of activity.

Develop and extend ongoing partnerships with Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islander and First Nations community arts and cultural centres within the ACT, across Australia and throughout the Pacific region, through skills development exchanges and residencies.

Establish a dedicated studio residency program for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists.

Ensure consideration of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander representation and participation across all professional development opportunities, including exhibitions and outreach projects.

Provide opportunities for training in cultural awareness and competency for staff, Board members and volunteers.

Actively pursue opportunities for the inclusion of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices in governance and management.

Actively support and assist the establishment of the dedicated Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Art Space within the development of the future arts precinct at Kingston, and the inclusion of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices in planning for the precinct.



STRATEGIC COMMITMENT 2

Inclusive and accessible artistic and creative practice

Megalo's heritage is founded upon our role as a partner for multiple community voices, of all backgrounds and abilities, and championing equity and recognition. It is essential for us to live up to this responsibility, and we will continue to reach out and welcome the inclusion of artists and audiences representing the full diversity of the ACT and beyond.

Key Activities

Develop and extend ongoing partnerships with peer community organisations, through creative development opportunities and programs.

Design and deliver effective workshop courses addressing the specific needs and abilities of participants with diverse abilities in collaboration with peer community organisations, include off-site and outreach initiatives.

Maintain ongoing assessment and upgrades of studio accessibility in consultation with peer organisations and members; and actively pursue opportunities to enhance and upgrade accessibility of facilities and equipment.

Provide opportunities for training in accessibility and inclusivity competency for staff, Board members and volunteers.

Ensure consideration of inclusivity, diversity and gender equity in the development of all professional development opportunities, including representation in exhibitions, residencies and outreach projects.

Actively pursue opportunities for the inclusion of diverse voices in governance and management.

Actively support and assist the inclusion of diverse voices and perspectives in planning for the future arts precinct at Kingston.



STRATEGIC COMMITMENT 3

Innovative, experimental and cross-disciplinary print practice

The field of print is uniquely positioned to take advantage of the development of new technologies, as a discipline founded upon collaboration and innovation across multiple artforms. Megalo has always enthusiastically embraced this potential, marrying the pursuit of experimentation with a commitment to maintaining core techniques and modes of practice.

Key Activities

Develop strong collaborative relationships with peer organisations in cross-disciplinary experimental, digital and hybrid practices.

Pursue opportunities for staff skills development in the provision of technical support for cross-disciplinary practice, including training programs and professional exchanges.

Develop the Megalo Editions initiative as a collaborative and sustainable model of partnership between Megalo printers and creative practitioners across multiple disciplines.

Actively support and assist planning for the inclusion of cross-disciplinary facilities within the development of the future arts precinct at Kingston.

Develop a sustainable model for the extension of studio facilities into crossdisciplinary practice, and pursue partnership opportunities to support growth in this area.

Increasing opportunities for developing creative and professional practice in print

Megalo's facilities and services are unique in Australia in the scope we offer for artists and creative practitioners to experiment and expand their practice at all career stages. In this period, still governed by the sector-wide need to recover and re-establish sustainability, the opportunities that Megalo provides in creation, presentation and promotion will be more essential than ever before.

Actively promote Megalo facilities for the design and delivery of artistic and commercial commissions.

Embedding engagement with print throughout the cultural life of Canberra and beyond

As Australia's leading open print organisation, Megalo Print Studio has a specific and key role to play in supporting national and international recognition of Canberra as the arts capital of Australia. Our activities across the ACT and beyond will consistently serve not only to raise the public profile of our own special place, but to demonstrate the vibrancy of contemporary print practice and our partner disciplines.

Promote and provide access to the Megalo archive collection as a living expressive record of print and social practice across the developing communities of Canberra and the ACT. Actively support and participate in territory-wide celebrations of creativity, innovation and design, in partnership with colleagues and peer organisations across multiple sectors of community, business and government. Undertake a comprehensive review of organisational branding and marketing, with consideration towards the development of the future arts precinct at Kingston.

Ensuring sustainability and supporting organisational growth

The achievement of our creative and community aspirations will only be possible if Megalo is able to maintain itself as a strong and resilient organisation. Sound governance and financial management remain fundamental to our ongoing development; and we actively seek to strengthen our capacities through diverse and collaborative operations.
